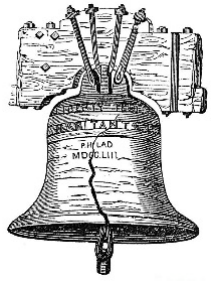

One Hour Walking Tours of Historic Philadelphia



- Walking tours begin at the registration desk of the Marriott Hotel.

Tour 1 - Founding the United States

This hour long walking tour meets at the Marriott Hotel and then heads east on Market Street to Independence Hall. Completed in 1753 to serve as the State House for the province of Pennsylvania, the Continental Congress met here from 1775 to 1783. The Declaration of Independence (in 1776) and the Constitution (in 1787) were adopted here. From 1790 to 1800 this was the seat of the United States government during the presidency of George Washington. The Liberty Bell is housed across the street.

Tour 2 - Ghetto to Gayborhood

This tour of Philly's Gayborhood will tell the story of how Center City's "20th century gay ghetto" became a 21st century inclusive and welcoming neighborhood. We'll talk about the "Spruce Street Boys" and Philadelphia's pivotal role in the 60s Homophile Movement. We'll explore the "Lurid Locust" Street of the 70s and the booming 80s club culture along Walnut and Chestnut Streets. Finally we'll wander through the alleys and side streets of today's Gayborhood, talking about bars, bookstores and community spaces. **Wed., Nov. 15, 1PM; Thurs, Nov. 16, 4PM; Friday, Nov. 17, 10AM;**

Tour 3 - Raising a Glass to Prohibition

This hour long walking tour, from City Hall to Camac Street, Philadelphia's "Greenwich Village," highlights the sensational history of National Prohibition in William Penn's Quaker city. Learn about the surprising Pennsylvania origin of the term "speakeasy," the battle between City Hall and Director of Public Safety Major Butler, bootleggers, wets vs. dries and the enduring legacy of Governor Gifford Pinchot on Pennsylvania's peculiar liquor laws.

Tour 4 - Mural Arts Restorative Justice Trolley Tour - Friday, Nov 17, 10AM -12PM

Explore the world's largest art gallery—the murals of Philadelphia—by heated trolley and see how "art ignites change." Mural Arts Philadelphia has united artists and communities to create art that transforms public spaces and lives. The Restorative Justice Program works with neighbors affected by crime, facilitating the forging of positive bonds between incarcerated, formerly incarcerated, or at-risk individuals and their communities. The tour takes you to justice-themed murals created through the program. **Cost is \$20 for grad students; \$25 for others. (Cheaper than an independent tour!)**
